## LIVING STORIES

This year I'm marking the fifth anniversary of my graduation from Gettysburg Seminary. It seems like a cliché to say "how the time has flown," but it has. A couple weeks ago, my graduating class of 2010 celebrated a reunion at the seminary Spring Academy. There were two alumni luncheons and a dinner—one in a nice restaurant and the other two in the refectory where we ate daily as students. And of course, there was the obligatory foray to Sharpshooters Bar and Grill on Rte 30 where we always filled up on Wednesday nights with cheap wings and Yuengings.

What was important though wasn't the food or location, it was being together with people I had grown to love and be loved by so deeply. We gathered as we did beginning nine years ago as entering students, unsure of ourselves but knowing we had some kind of call from God to do this. What was really remarkable was that despite all the changes—many of my classmates have added spouses, children, grandchildren, the discovery of new gifts and joys in ministry, as well as losses or difficult challenges in their work—it seemed like things hadn't changed. We took up right where we left off.

We began with stories—what are you doing now? How is ministry going for you? A lot can happen in five years and there's only so much we can glean from Facebook! And then we progressed to ...“remember when we...?” We recalled fun times and also times that were so tough that we never could have made it to graduation in 2010 without each other. And then the stories turned to the future—what are you planning for the next few years? What new ministry ideas do you have?

All of it came down to stories, and as I think about the latest crop of graduates we have here at St. John's, I think about the stories they take with them and the stories they are yet to tell. From this faith community, they have the foundation of the stories of our faith: the time-honored stories of creation and Noah's ark; the testimony of the prophets; the accounts of Jesus' life, death and resurrection; the reports of how the church began with tongues of fire and continued as the apostles wrote to the budding congregations who met in catacombs and homes. Those scripture stories are foundational for a life of Christian faith.

But there are more stories—stories of the love and support they received here at St. John's. Those stories are the beginnings of the new stories they will write with their lives. Our place for them is to be the touchstone that keeps the stories alive.

So to all graduates—congratulations! We are proud of you and we love you. God is still writing your story and will always keep you in tender care, whatever joys and challenges come. That goes not just for the people receiving diplomas this year, but for the rest of us as well.

## **A LETTER FROM THE CHURCH COUNCIL**

Dear Members of St. John's,

The church is much more than a business; however, in reality it only functions on basic financial and business principles. One problem all churches suffer is "cash flow" deficits. St John's Lutheran is not an exception. Bills for utilities, salaries, and programs are generated every day and must be paid in a timely manner. When contributions do not meet expenditures the only options we have are to cut expenditures, borrow from existing funds or borrow from lending institutions. The council has decided to initiate a stewardship program one step at a time.

When we miss church for personal reasons, weather, etc., we tend not to contribute or make up our giving. The bills never cease. Therefore the council members encourage ALL members to informally pledge to themselves a continuity of giving each month. We strongly feel that this is a viable start toward stewardship and fulfilling our monetary obligations.

Matthew 26:6 reads, *When Jesus was at Bethany, a guest of Simon the Leper, a woman came up to him as he was eating dinner and anointed him with a bottle of very expensive perfume.*

In his commentary William Barclay tells us that the perfume was probably worth a year's wages. "It shows us love's extravagance. The woman took the most precious thing she had and poured it on Jesus.... Love never thinks how little it can decently give.... We have not even begun to be Christians if we think of giving to Christ and to His Church in terms of how little we respectably can give."

We probably don't think about giving as little as we decently can but we've probably never thought much about our giving at all. I know that's not true of everyone who is reading this. There are many members of this church who prayerfully and thoughtfully give as much as they possible can. There are many members who give generously of their time and talent. We couldn't function without them. Realistically we can't function without money either. Please make a commitment to St John's. Christ gave up his life for you. What are you willing to give to Him?

Dear members of the Saint John's Family,

I wanted to write to thank you for taking part in planning and participating in the Fair Trade fundraiser on my behalf on May 3<sup>rd</sup>. I got an email from my mom the day afterward telling me that every piece of coffee and chocolate was sold and that many people told her specifically that they did not want me to write them a thank-you note after donating because they didn't want me to go to any extra trouble. So I wanted to take this opportunity to thank you all. I appreciate so much that you all went to such lengths to support me. I am so thankful that the proceeds of this fundraiser benefit not only my accompaniment work – which takes place in the context of a history of violence, war, and trauma – and benefits small farmers' cooperatives – which build resilient economies that are less vulnerable to the exploitation that leads to the kind of conflict Guatemala experienced.

Thank you so much for your donations and purchases! In part due to the fundraiser you organized, I have reached and exceeded my fundraising goal! Any donations over my fundraising budget will benefit SEPA (my Oberlin-based sponsoring community, an organization that gives middle and high school scholarships to Guatemalan youth in remote towns), NISGUA (the organization that is sending me to Guatemala), and the Guatemalan Human Rights Commission.

Please keep me in your prayers as I travel to Guatemala in late July for language school, and please keep the people of Guatemala in your prayers in the wake of the recent resignation of the vice-president and the details of the corruption scandal known as *La Línea* continue to come to light. When scandals like this come to light, it is especially important that we continue to pray for a more just future, in our words and in our actions. Thank you so much for your support so far!

# CONFUSION

Opening day! A crowd of people, congregating around the edge of a baseball diamond, waited for the announcer to begin the opening-day program. "The sun is out and the snow is gone and only a slight wind remains. Time to open this year's season." Everyone clapped. It had been another horrendous winter and at last the weather had decided to cooperate. "We'll begin the program in a few minutes."

We continued to wait for several more minutes near the T-ball section where our grandson waited with his teammates. The group of five-year-olds proudly wore new baseball caps and T-shirts, but their hesitation was obvious. Music blared from the podium sending jolts of current through waiting participants and supporters alike. Chicken dancing mixed in with jumping and a few parents took the opportunity to show off their smoother moves. Games of chase and tag became contagious and frenzy and excitement spilled over the groups. Finally, the announcer began, using a sound system loud enough to blanket over the noise and talking. A type of calm returned and the organization and direction of the event unfolded. Well-organized and efficient, the crowd of players in teams moved through a double line of other teams, slapping hands and running, and welcoming each other to the new season. What appeared initially as confusion turned out to be something quite opposite. There was a plan after all, a well-thought-out plan.

We experience confusion and chaos as we travel through life. Life happens, unexpectedly or not, and when it does, it can plow right through our best intentions, expectations and logical calculations. Confusion follows. How? Why? I didn't see this coming. This doesn't make any sense.

The apostles certainly understood confusion. One evening they were celebrating the Passover with Jesus, their rabbi, the messiah, the hope of Israel and the Jewish kingdom; but before the end of the next day, he lay in a tomb. Jesus preached about bringing a new order, a new kingdom to this earth, overpowering any earthly kingdom. If he truly was the messiah, how could the Romans crucify him? Surely God would have sent an army of angels to protect Jesus. Was he really who he said he was? Unable to comprehend God's plan, the disciples, confused and disoriented, scattered after the death of Jesus. Peter, filled with panic and fear, denied knowing Jesus, not once but three times. It wasn't until after Jesus' resurrection and the coming of the Holy Spirit that his followers began to understand God's plan, began to understand the meanings behind his teachings, words and actions.

The winter of death, overcome, the plan revealed then and now; it's time to play ball.

*The chief priests and our rulers handed him over to be sentenced to death, and they crucified him; but we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel.* Luke 24: 20-21, NIV

*Then he opened their minds so they could understand the Scriptures. ## THE KENYA CONNECTION

This month I would like to introduce you to a couple of the children I became very close to while I was at Pathfinder Academy. I first met Eliya at the vespers service the first Friday night we were there. Team Kenya was sitting in the front row as various groups of children got up and sang. There was a little boy sitting behind me that rested his chin on my shoulder and proceeded to sing the words to every song being performed. I was amazed by his beautiful voice and the fact that he knew the words to all of the songs. He could only have been 5 or 6 years old. From that point forward, he was my buddy and always sought me out at vespers and when he had free time.

There was another boy, John, who looked just like Eliya and about a week after we were there, I finally realized that there were two of them. Whenever I saw them apart, I never knew who it was. Finally, a day before we left, they told me they were twins and that they also had a sister, Saida. I knew they were all orphans, but other than that, I left without knowing much about them. I really wanted to know more about these children, so I got in touch with Joshua (the director at Pathfinder), and here is the response I received:

Eliya, John and Saida are not related. The three are from Kipsongo slums and were used to the streets, begging for food and money. They were brought to Pathfinder Academy from Sister Freda when they were really young. We have done all that we can do to get them where they are and we thank God for being there for us plus our friends and supporters like Team Kenya. Their great need is an after-school program, additional clothing and milk on a weekly basis.

I am so thankful that I was able to be a part of their lives while I was there. I only wish they could realize how much they touched my life. I have pictures of them on my desk at work and I think of them and pray for them every day. Please keep them in your prayers and also remember all who are less fortunate than we are.

There is a book that I've read since I've been back and I would like to recommend it for anyone who would like some insight into life in an orphanage in Kenya. It is called *Hope Runs: an American Tourist, a Kenyan boy, a journey at redemption*, by Claire Diaz-Ortiz. You can find a copy of it at the Thurmont Library.


